Safety Meeting Recap

Working Safely with Electricity



Electrocution accounted for about 8% of construction worker deaths in 2021.

Generators are commonly used as a replacement source of electricity when electrical power is lost or not available. Carbon monoxide is a colorless, odorless gas produced during the operation of gasoline powered generators. When inhaled, the gas reduces your ability to transport oxygen.

- DO NOT operate a generator indoors. Generators should be placed outdoors in a location where the exhaust gases cannot enter a home or building. Good ventilation is key to operating a generator safely.
- Turn off generators and let them cool prior to refueling.

Overhead and buried power lines are especially hazardous because they carry dangerously high voltage. Fatal electrocution is the main risk, but burns and falls are also hazards.

- Look for overhead power lines and buried power line indicators.
- Stay at least 10 feet away from overhead power lines and assume they are energized.
- De-energize and ground lines when working near them.
 Use non-conductive wood near power lines.

Worn extension cords can expose the wires within, or loosen the connections on the plug end. Extension cords that are not 3-wire type, not designed for hard-usage, or that have been modified are not as durable. These conditions can increase the risk of electric shock.

- Do not modify cords or use them incorrectly.
- Use factory-assembled cord sets and extension cords that are 3-wire type.
- Remove cords from receptacles by pulling on the plugs, not the cords.
- Visually inspect all electrical equipment before use. Remove from service any equipment with frayed cords, missing ground prongs, cracked tool casings, etc

Do's and Don'ts



DO: Always make sure to take your time and make sure caulk is spread over the end caps/miters evenly and thick enough it won't cause leaks. There will be times where we will have to go out to repair a leak from caulk not drying correctly - but it should not be as often as we are currently are. Taking your time to double check these things during the install can save you from a service call down the road!

DO: You MUST take thorough notes on service calls. If you are using ANY material - note it in the service call WIB <u>AND</u> the footage/pieces you used in the main WIB. You also have to take **before and after pictures** during all service calls of the areas that were worked on. These can either be put in the drive or emailed to Joe with the job name.

DON'T: If you are at a warrantied service call - do not do any work (even if the customers asks) that would be billable without communicating with the office for a quote.

This months spot light is on Mitch!






